Long Range Planning Report

The Royal Canadian Legion's Veterans Services Network works on behalf of Veterans to ensure they receive the benefits they deserve. We offer assistance and information on sometimes-complicated processes.

The Legion's Veterans Services Network consists of volunteer Branch Service Officers and <u>Professional Command Service Officers</u> who provide assistance at all stages of the disability claim process, free of charge, whether or not you are a Legion member. <u>More ...</u>

How We Kept Branch 641 Going During the Pandemic

Two years ago, when COVID-19 raised its ugly head, the branch executive discussed closing the branch, specifically how long would we be closed and how would we manage to pay our rent and utilities if the branch wasn't bringing in any money. Two years later, our president is happy to share that thanks to several government grants, we remain in a strong financial position as funds from these grants have helped us to cover our bills. "Whenever I heard that a grant was available, I went online and researched it to find out if we qualified or not," said Stephane Guy. "Some sites were not very user-friendly or the documents were not easy to complete, in one case because they required specific financial details that required the expertise of our treasurer. For one grant, the initial registration process took two months but thereafter, each subsequent month, the registration process took 15 minutes.

Here are some of the resources Stephane was able to tap into:

- Canada Emergency Commercial Rent Assistance
- Canada Emergency Rent Subsidy
- Ontario Energy costs reimbursement
- Ontario Small Business Grant

We don't know if other branches of the Royal Canadian Legion were successful at accessing government grants, but the Barrhaven Legion Branch 641 is very lucky to have been able to tap into these grants which allowed us to keep our doors open and provide support to Veterans and their families and our community throughout the two years of pandemic.



Meet Some of Our Ordinary Members

This month, let's meet Lyle Brennan, our Sergeant at Arms, Youth Education & Bursary Chair and one of our bartenders – a man of many hats here at branch 641.

Major Lyle Brennan, CD joined 706 squadron as an Air cadet in 1991: he attended Basic, Junior Instructor Course, Survival Instructor Course, and was employed twice as a Staff Cadet, once at CFB Borden and then CFB Bagotville. He was promoted to Warrant Officer 1st Class, awarded the Lord Strathcona Medal, and graduated from the program in 1997. He worked as a Civilian Instructor with 706 until 2002 when he enrolled in the Canadian Armed Forces and held various positions within the squadron, and in 2007 he was appointed as the Commanding Officer of 706 and promoted to the rank of Captain. He led 706 to the Taylor Trophy "Most Proficient Squadron in the Ottawa Valley" for 2008-09 training year. In 2010, he was appointed as the Commanding Officer of 742 National Capital Squadron and promoted to the rank of Major. He led 742 to the Taylor Trophy which they retained throughout his command and beyond. In 2012, Major Brennan was awarded the Queens Diamond Jubilee Medal. In 2013, he was presented with the RCAF Commanders Coin and received a national recognition award from the Air Cadet League recognizing his outstanding leadership at 742. He was later appointed to a regional level position within RCSU(E) as the Zone Officer for the Ottawa Valley responsible for the 17 area units. In 2015 Major Brennan received his Canadian Forces Decoration (C.D.) for 12+ years of service with the CAF. In 2017, he was confirmed as the J3 Area Elemental Advisor (Air) for the Ottawa Valley (16 Air, Army and Sea cadet units). For six years, as both Zone Officer and J3 AEA, he has worked closely with the CO's and league partners, providing guidance and co-




ordinating regional activities. In the fall of 2018, Major Brennan received the RCSU(E) CO's coin and a command commendation for his leadership and efforts. In May 2019, he took on role as the NCR Project Coordinator managing the national level tasks afforded to Eastern Region's Cadets in the Outaouais & Ottawa Valley. In July 2020, Major Brennan was appointed as Commanding Officer of 742 National Capital Squadron and honoured to have the opportunity to lead the squadron for another term.


In his civilian role and full-time capacity, Major Brennan is a Federal Public Servant employed in IM/IT at Shared Services Canada. From 2002-2012 he worked within the Information Management Group - ADM(IM) at the Department of National Defence holding positions at the National and Regional levels within various: Network, Telecom, Data Centre and IT Security roles. He received the Assistant Deputy Minister Information Management Group (ADM(IM)) coin for his leadership in support of the ADM's change gang initiative. In 2012, He was transferred to Shared Services



Canada, during its creation and appointed to the position of Acting Director Defence Network Services responsible for the Network, Telecom, and IT Security Services SSC provided to National Defence globally. He was then appointed to Acting Director Detection Security Services within SSC. In 2014, he accepted a deployment to Administrative Tribunals Support Service of Canada where he led the establishment of the department's IT Security Program. In 2017, he returned to the Department of National Defence within the IT Engineering Group and led the Program Management Office for Communication, Computers, Command and Control, Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance. (C4ISR). In 2018, he accepted an opportunity at Shared Services Canada and was promoted to his current position as Director Enterprise Facilities Operations leading the end-to-end facilities management of the Government of Canada's Enterprise Data Centres.

Cheque Presentation

At the February 2022 Executive Meeting, a cheque in the amount of \$2,000 was presented to the <u>Gallant Knights Charity Sports Association</u>. There's an interesting and "challenging" background story to this cheque presentation.

Founded in 2019, the Gallant Knights Charity Sports Association (NFP) has donated just over \$40,000 worth of adaptive sports equipment to well deserving Veterans in Ontario and across Canada. The mission of the Gallant Knights "is to enhance the morale and wellbeing of injured and ill Veterans by providing financial assistance supporting their return to sporting or recreational activities." Cory Moore is the Founding Director of the Gallant Knights.

"Our fundraising campaign kicked off with a bang in January 2022 thanks to President Stéphane Guy who, on behalf of its executive and members, made a donation from lottery funds of \$2,000 towards our goal," said Moore.

"Unexpectedly, President Guy then issued a challenge to other branches to "meet or beat" their donation. "Challenge accepted!" said a voice and with that, 1st Vice-President Bob MacNichol and President Shawn Taillon subsequently made a lottery funds donation of \$2,500 on behalf of the

executive and members of Branch 593 Bells Corners. "Consequently, we are now onethird of the way towards making our funding goal a reality."

Stéphane has extended the challenge to the Orleans Legion although nothing has been picked up as of the time of writing.
